

BREWING INDUSTRY NOTES:

Reported in the Brewers Bulletin, June 1957.


A study of 78 small breweries showed that their average profit was about 60¢ a barrel and total sales of the industry last year, approximately 85 million barrels, were unchanged from the year before.

Per cent of per capita income spent for beer and ale was 1.67 per cent in 1955. while in 1940 this amounted to 2.49 per cent of income, the survey said.

Prices of premium beers have increased about 80 per cent since 1940, and local brands have gone up 35 per cent. "Local Brands, to meet competition, have been forced

to absorb a higher percentage of an increased production cost," it was noted.


L. HARMY WATCHING DEPALLETIZED

Our new warehouse began operations the first week of August and has since proven to be just what our customers ordered... fast and efficient service. With the 11,000 square feet of storage space we can give our distributors and Bottle trucks the best service available. Every person from the janitors to the supervision is to be congratulated for helping to bring about a successful operation.

The internal activities of the warehouse are handled by a giant palletizer which receives case beer by conveyors from the Bottle




LOADING DOCKS



INTERIOR OF WAREHOUSE


Shop and automatically stacks the cases in pallets. These pallets are then picked up by automatic loading trucks and placed in the various areas in the warehouse for storage. This is an impressive operation to see, especially. when you consider the amount of work that is accomplished in such a short time. Another fascinating phase of the total operations is a machine called a depalletizer, This is used for breaking down pallets of empty cases. As a pallet of empty cases are placed on the rack by loading trucks the depalletizer automatically picks

the pallet up and layer by layer disassembles them on a conveyor which in turn delivers them to the Bottle Shop for refilling with more of that delicious Bavarian/s Beer.

The palletizer operators are; Ray Webster, Clasper Kloentrup, Jim Deaton, Leroy Harms, Jerome Kleier, Eugene Grannemas, and Paul Repasy. The over-all operations are vastly superior to our previous methods and the benefits of this efficient operation is passed on to our customers because it is another guarantee that the finest and freshest beer made is delivered by Bavarian's Beer Delivery Personnel.


FIRE FIGHTING DEMONSTRATIONS



on TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS

Here are six tips from the National Safety Council's Committee on Winter Driving Hazards for motorists who have to drive on ice or snow-covered roads:

- I. Be Prepared, Winterize your driving techniques and your determination to avoid accidents, as well as your car.
- 2. Check your tires. Whether you use regular or snow tires, make sure they're in good condition. Use reinforced tire chains for deep or hard-packed snow, ice, and in emergency traction situations. Even with chains, slow down.

GET THE FFEL OF ROAD

- 3. Make sure you can see. Keep windshield and windows clear. Make sure that wiper blades, heater and defroster are in proper operating condition. Ventilate to keep the inside of car windows from fogging.
- 4: Get the feel of the road, As soon as you start out (but away from other cars or hazarda) try your brakes occasionally to learn road conditions.
- 5. Don't follow other cars too closely, Following too closely, a syear-round hazard, is especially dangerous in winter. Keep well back of the vehicle shead.

or for stopping quickly, pump your brakes in a series of quick applications. Jamming on the brakes is certain to lock the wheels and throw a car into an uncontrollable skid.

Above all, the Committee on Winter Driving Hazards says, take it easy.

WORST AID


